WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.2 through 7.5, the *Holland Township* has been declared eligible to participate in the program by the Division of Local government Services, and the Chief Financial officer has determined that the local government meets the necessary conditions to participate in the program for the 2022 budget year.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of *Holland, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey* that in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.6a & 7.6b and based upon the Chief Financial Officer's certification, the governing body has found the budget has met the following requirements:

1. That with reference to the following items, the amounts have been calculated pursuant to law and appropriated as such in the budget:

- a. Payment of interest and debt redemption charges
- b. Deferred charges and statutory expenditures
- c. Cash deficit of preceding year
- d. Reserve for uncollected taxes
- e. Other reserves and non-disbursement items
- f. Any inclusions of amounts required for school purposes.

2. That the provisions relating to limitation on increases of appropriations pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.2 and appropriations for exceptions to limits on appropriations found at N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.3 et seq., are fully met (complies with CAP law).

3. That the budget is in such form, arrangement, and content as required by the Local Budget Law and N.J.A.C. 5:30-4 and 5:30-5.

- 4. That pursuant to the Local Budget Law:
 - a. All estimates of revenue are reasonable, accurate and correctly stated,
 - b. Items of appropriation are properly set forth
 - c. In itemization, form, arrangement and content, the budget will
 - permit the exercise of the comptroller function within the municipality.

5. The budget and associated amendments have been introduced and publicly advertised in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Local Budget Law, except that failure to meet the deadlines of N.J.S.A. 40A:4-5 shall not prevent such certification.

6. That all other applicable statutory requirements have been fulfilled.

ORDINANCE 2022-05 AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF TOWNSHIP-OWNED PROPERTY AT 914 MILFORD-WARREN GLEN ROAD, BLOCK 6, LOT 1.02

WHEREAS, the Township of Holland is the record owner of the property at 914 Milford-Warren Glen Road, Block 6, Lot 1.02 (the "Property"), on the Tax Map of the Township of Holland; and

WHEREAS, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12-13(a) authorizes a municipality to enter into an open public sale at auction to the highest bidder for property that is not needed for public use; and

WHEREAS, the Township determined that the Property is not needed for public use, and that the Property should be sold by open public sale at auction to the highest bidder; and

WHEREAS, an auction was held on March 7, 2022, all bids were rejected; therefore, the Property should be sold to the highest bidder at a second auction; and

WHEREAS, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12-13(a) requires the Township to advertise the sale of the property in the newspaper and hold a public auction.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township Holland, County of Hunterdon in the state of New Jersey as follows:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> The Mayor of the Township of Holland and other necessary Township officials are hereby authorized to enter into a second public sale of the Property owned by the Township, in accordance with <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12-13(a) and to take all reasonable, necessary and lawful steps to effectuate the sale of the property, including execution of the appropriate deed and transfer documents.

SECTION 2. The Township shall advertise the sale of the Property in a newspaper circulating in the Township by two insertions at least once a week during two consecutive weeks, the last publication to be not earlier than seven days prior to such sale.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> The terms of sale shall be as follows:

- a. Bids shall be accepted electronically by GovDeals.com until Friday, April 29, 2022, at 4pm.
- b. Minimum bid price of \$500,000.00.
- c. The bid must be accompanied by a deposit made payable to the Township of Holland in the form of cash, bank check, or cashier's check in the amount of 20% of the total bid. Pending closing of title, this deposit will be held by the Township in a non-interest-bearing escrow account, with the total deposit to be credited to the purchase price at closing. Full payment of the purchase price must be received within thirty (30) days of the date of the acceptance of the bid. Unsuccessful bidders will have their deposits returned.

d. In the event that the successful bidder fails to close title to the Property, the bidder shall forfeit all deposit monies made to the Township. No refunds whatsoever will be made by the Township in the event that the successful bidder fails to complete the purchase of the Property within thirty (30) days from the acceptance of the bid.

The Property is being sold "AS IS" "WHERE IS." The Property is sold subject to existing encumbrances, liens, easements, zoning ordinances, other restrictions of record, such facts as an accurate survey would reveal and any assessments. No representation is made by the Township as to the utility, usability or environmental condition of the Property, except as otherwise set forth herein.

- e. The deed given by the Township to the Property will be a Quitclaim Deed. No title contingencies or conditions are permitted.
- f. The sale shall be subject to adjournment or cancellation by the Township Committee.
- g. The sale shall be subject to restrictions of record and local ordinances.
- h. The Township shall retain the right to reject all bids.

<u>SECTION 4.</u> In the event that any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be limited in its effect only to that portion of the Ordinance actually adjudged to be invalid, and the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall be deemed severable therefrom and shall not be affected.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> All ordinances or parts of ordinances deemed to be inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> This ordinance shall become effectively immediately upon final adoption and publication in accordance with the laws of the State of New Jersey.

-**RESOLUTION**- Approving Close Out Costs or DPW Garage / Library Remediation Site Mr. Wilhelm moved and Ms. Mickey seconded the motion to adopt the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION

Approving Close Out Costs for DPW Garage / Library Remediation Site

WHEREAS, in November 1993, RK Occupational and Environmental Analysis, Inc. (RK) began working with the Township to develop a plan to address the underground storage tanks (UST) at the DPW Garage / Library site, and

WHEREAS, beginning in the late 1980's motor fuel UST's were regulated by Federal Law and Heating Oil UST's were regulated by the State to be upgraded by December 1998, and

WHEREAS, at the time there were five (5) existing UST's on the Garage / Library site. These included the following tanks and their usage at the time:

Tank A-1	1,000 gallon	#2 heating oil Heat DPW Garage
Tank A-2	1,000 gallon	#2 heating oil Heat Library

Tank D-1	1,000 gallon	low sulfur diesel fuel Fuel DPW trucks
Tank G-1	1,000 gallon	regular gasoline Misc fueling incl school buses
Tank G-2	500 gallon	premium gasoline Fuel police cars

WHEREAS, both Federal and State regulations did not necessarily require the removal of the UST's. They did require that the tanks be upgraded to have leak detection and containment, overfill and spill protection in addition to cathodic protection from tank corrosion. The only practical way to achieve these upgrades was to remove and replace the tanks, and

WHEREAS, the plan developed by RK included two phases

- Phase I: install a new diesel fuel tank at the DPW Garage site along with a new key card dispenser system at the Holland Township School gasoline tanks for use by Township and School vehicles.
- Phase II: remove the 3 motor fuel tanks and the heating oil tank at the Garage. The 1,000 gallon heating oil tank at the Library was modified to heat the DPW Garage site of the building as well.

WHEREAS, bids to remove the four (4) UST's were solicited and awarded in December 1994. The tank removal field work began in May 1995. The three (3) motor fuel UST's were installed side by side and were removed from a common excavation, and

WHEREAS, there was evidence of contamination in the excavation from leakage and overfilling of the gasoline UST's. All potentially contaminated soils were removed from the bottom and sides of the excavation. Approximately 100 tons of suspect contaminated soil was removed and disposed. Post excavation soil sampling showed that all contamination was addressed and NJDEP closed these UST cases, and

WHEREAS, during the removal of the Tank D-1, significant corrosion of the tank was observed. In addition, soil contamination was present from product leakage into the immediate area around the tank. To the extent possible, contaminated soils were removed from around the bottom and sides of the UST excavation and approximately 150 tons of contaminated soil were disposed of, and

WHEREAS, excavation could not be completed because the bottom was bedrock. In addition, there was evidence of floating oil product on the ground water accumulating in the excavation. Finally, post excavation soil samples of the sidewalls exceeded NJDEP soil cleanup standards, and

WHEREAS, three (3) ground water monitoring wells were installed in July 1996 and monthly sampling in August and September 1996 showed heating oil impacts to the ground water from the tank leaks. Six (6) additional monitoring wells were installed in November 1996 to further delineate the ground water impacts to the site, and

WHEREAS, a passive collection system was installed initially in monitor well #2 in order to collect the free-product that has been observed in that well proved ineffective, and

WHEREAS, a short-term well pump test was conducted and showed that not all wells were hydraulically connected. Later a 24-hour pump test was performed to understand the capacity of the shallow aquifer to support an active remediation system and at what pumping rate, and

WHEREAS, a NJPDES discharge permit was obtained for discharging treated ground water effluent to an environmentally sensitive surface water stream, and

WHEREAS, the active remediation "Pump and Treat" system was put into operation in late December 2010 and was operated continuously until August 2019, and

WHEREAS, ground water sampling conducted in 2020 and 2021 has concluded that there were no sampling results that exceed current NJ GWQS. As such, no further remedial action is required at the site, and

WHEREAS, quotes to close and seal the monitoring wells were requested from three licensed well drillers; two responses were received. The lower quote received was from Hawk Drilling Inc., of

Hampton, NJ in the amount of \$4,500.00. RK recommends award of the contract to Hawk Drilling, and

WHEREAS, RK has reviewed a plan with Department of Public Woks Superintendent, Corey Colaluce to work with the DPW employees as needed to partially dismantle components in and move the trailer, and

WHEREAS, several drums of sludge and wash water waste will be generated for disposal while cleaning the Oil-Water Separator in the trailer, and

WHEREAS, Brockerhoff Environmental of Washington, NJ has been the project licensed site remediation professional on this project since the LSRP regulations became effective in 2011, and

WHEREAS, they have prepared a Remedial Action Report that shows that environmental cleanup standards have been met at the site and no further action is required by the Township, and

WHEREAS, after completion of the well closure, the LSRP will issue a Remedial Action Outcome (RAO) report, which is the very last step in the process.

NOW, THEREFRE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Committee in the Township of Holland, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey, that they award the contract to close and seal the monitoring wells at the DPW garage to Hawk Drilling Inc. for the quoted price of \$4,500 and approve Brockerhoff Environmental for the final clean up and preparation of the Remedial Action Report.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Township Committee thanks RK Occupational and Environmental Analysis, Inc. for their commitment to complete this project.
